

**CMSD 3130
INTRODUCTION TO AUDIOLOGY
SPRING 2006**

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Overview: This course is designed to familiarize the student with the field of Audiology in general, the educational requirements necessary to practice Audiology and professional opportunities. It also introduces the students to issues related to the assessment and diagnosis of hearing, disorders of the auditory system and intervention strategies, both medical and rehabilitative, that are used to meet the needs of the hearing impaired.

Prerequisite or Co-requisite: CMSD 3030 or permission of the department

Objectives: At the end of this course the student should be able to:

1. Discuss the field of Audiology as a profession. (III-G, III-H)
2. Describe behavioral, physiologic, and electrophysiologic measurements used in the assessment of peripheral and central auditory function. These measurements include pure tones, speech, acoustic immittance, otoacoustic emissions, and auditory brainstem response. (III-A, III-B, III-C, III-D)
3. Describe, discuss and differentiate various auditory pathologies and their effects on hearing. (III-C)
4. Explain hearing aid function and discuss management strategies used in meeting rehabilitative needs of the hearing impaired. (III-D)
