Course Description:

This course examines legal principles applicable to public education, the legal structure of the public school system, and legal problems issues to students and teachers.<sup>1</sup>

Course Objectives:

Students studying school law will:

1. Develop an awareness of American governance systems, sources of the law, and the role of courts in American education.
2. Explore legal principles, ideology, and jurisprudential maxims such as “we are a nation of laws, not men.”
3. Explore constitutional principles and their application to the public school context.
4. Review court decisions, statutory law, and administrative regulations regarding public education.
5. Review federal and state constitutions.
6. Converse and reflect on legal principles and their application to public schools.
7. Engage in legal research, and present and debate findings on legal problems related to public schools.

Course Outline:

The following is a list of the major topics we will study this semester. Topics appear in the general order they will be discussed, though flexibility with the timeline will be essential.

3. The Establishment Clause and the Free Exercise Clause
4. Religion and the public schools
5. Freedom of expression for teachers and students
